NEWS AND VIEWS

The widow went and did as Elijah said, so that she as well as he and her household ate for many days. The jar of meal was not emptied, neither did the jug of oil fail, according to the word of the Lord that he spoke by Elijah. 1 Kings 17:15-16

When Elijah meets the widow of Zarephath, as the story is told to us in First Kings, he asks to be fed from the very last of her stores. She explains to him that she's gathering wood for the fire she'll make to cook the last meal she expects to eat before she and her son die of starvation. Still, he asks her to make him some bread.

Even though Elijah promises that she won't run out of flour and oil, how can she know this is true? The first miracle of the story is that she shares the very last that she has with this man who is asking for food and drink. In some ways, it overshadows the other miracles that follow – the never-empty jugs of oil and flour – because for the first miracle to be effective, the widow must first make the most daring risk.

This miracle is replayed often in the church. When faced with sometimes daunting challenges, I have witnessed our own congregation get creative, roll up its sleeves, and find ways to engage in mission and this past year has been no exception. In situations where old models were failing to attract new energy, we have had members volunteer their ideas, their wisdom, to help us move into new practices and ways of being together. From time to time we've been called on to take risks in order to extend our ministries, even if the path of how we might do that isn't abundantly clear.

In every one of these circumstances, miracles were present, because in every one of these circumstances there was more than enough. More than enough people to do the work, more than enough money to cover the costs, more than enough creativity to carry the project forward. When we are seeking to be and serve God's people, may we always remember the miracle, there is more than enough.

Deuteronomy 6:4-12

John 2:1-11

The Gospel of John starts out with a bang. After his cosmic overview of Jesus' life and work, he plops us down right in the middle of a wedding. It is a wedding with a problem, however, as the wine is gone and the festivities will come to a crashing halt. In a somewhat strange twist, in this gospel Jesus' first miracle is not a healing...but a sign of God's abundance that allows the joy of God's people gathered to continue.

In a worship service that incorporates the entirety of (Mozart's get this from Fred) we'll weave in the account from Deuteronomy where Moses institutes the practice of giving from the first fruits of harvest. In John, Jesus reiterates the abundance found in God as he boldly states that he is the bread of life...and that in him, no one should hunger anymore.

John 12:1-7

At the precipice of their entry into the land promised to them by God, Joshua pauses to call God's people to pledge again their trust in God and their commitment to follow in God's ways.

In John's gospel we see the same devotion expressed in gift, as a woman anoints Jesus' feet with costly perfume.

A Christmas pageant that includes you!

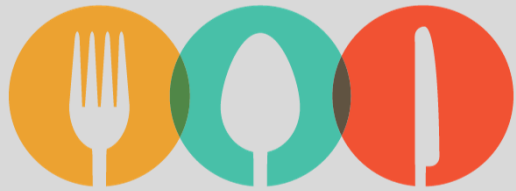

On Monday, Nov. 6 from 7:30-8:30 pm, Prof. Andrew Whitehead will speak at First Presbyterian Church about his new book, *American Idolatry: How Christian Nationalism Betrays the Gospel and Threatens the Church* (Brazos Press). He will also answer questions from the audience. Next Page Books will be selling his book afterward and coordinating a book signing.

On Tuesday, Nov. 7 from 11:15 am-12:10 pm, Dr. Whitehead will present at Kirkwood Community College in Ballantyne Auditorium on the topic of "The Ongoing Threat of White Christian Nationalism to Democracy in the United States," followed by Q&A from the audience. This event is open to the public.

Andrew Whitehead is an Associate Professor of Sociology and Director of the Association of Religion Data Archives (theARDA.com) at the Center for the Study of Religion and American Culture at IUPUI.

He is a sought-after speaker and one of the foremost scholars of Christian nationalism in the United States. His research has been featured in The New York Times, NPR, The New Yorker, The Washington Post, CNN Today, The Economist, Rolling Stone, and The Guardian. He has been interviewed on NBC News, National Public Radio, and the BBC, among other news outlets.

All Saints Sunday November 5th

In early Christian tradition, saints' days began as a way to mark the anniversary of a martyr's death — his or her "birthday" as a saint. By the middle of the church's first millennium, there were so many martyrs that it was hard to give them all their due. All Saints' Day was established as an opportunity to honor all the saints, known and unknown.

All Saints' Day has a rather different focus in the Presbyterian Church. While we may give thanks for the lives of particular luminaries of ages past, the emphasis is on the ongoing witness of the whole people of God. Rather than putting saints on pedestals as holy people set apart in glory, we give glory to God for the ordinary, holy lives of the believers in this and every age. It is a moment to remember that our own lives of faith have been shaped and supported by the many that have come before us and that we shape and support to experience of the faithful for years to come.

At First Presbyterian it is our tradition to read the names during worship of those who have died to this life in the prior year and light candles in remembrance as we hold them in prayer. Hope Builders Bicycle Program

I was lucky to have a father who was mechanically inclined who taught me how to change the oil in my car, replace my brakes, and build a wall and in the process taught me the value of hard work. But not everyone has those opportunities. My friend Daniel Reed has been coming alongside people in Cedar Rapids for over a decade to show them how to improve their own life situation. He started by inviting teens to his garage on the southwest side to show them how to build a bike, how to give back by volunteering in the community, and to then use that bike for positive good. Daniel currently lives at Geneva Towers and would like to bring that ministry to our church basement, but he needs a team of people to help him. The goal is to mentor up to twenty kids, with a group of three to four coming once a week, for a lesson on bikes and life. First Presbyterian has a rich history of offering not only handouts, but also hand-ups to the community. At one point, we had a workshop for the community in our basement. Daniel has invited us to continue in that tradition and to build hope with him by providing a space for young people to learn how to build bicycles with the support of positive adults.
