

#### LABOR ABUSE DOES EXIST IN IOWA

Yes, there really are instances of labor abuse in various industries in Iowa with disproportionate impact on immigrant communities and children – including labor trafficking. Our state's history provides many examples and there has been a recent uptick in violations as well. Adding insult to injury, the Iowa Legislature passed a law during the 2023 legislative session that has many negative implications. Join us for Intersections in-person or online to learn more about the labor abuses in Iowa and how you might use your voice to make a difference.

#### **Sermons for December**

How Does a Weary World Rejoice? **December 3** 

First Sunday of Advent How Does A Weary World Rejoice? *Luke 1:1-23, Psalm 80:1-7, 17-19* 

As Advent begins, we start by acknowledging the weariness, grief, and hopelessness we carry—and we also affirm that we are made for joy. Joy is designed to live in a full house of other emotions. We start the season with Zechariah and Elizabeth; they have battled infertility and have lived many years steadfast in their faith. Perhaps they feel the weight of hopes and dreams unattained. The angel comes to Zechariah with a promise of good news, but Zechariah can't fully receive it. Sometimes weariness can harden us and prevent us from living fully. We've had hard journeys with sadness, grief and disappointment as part of our days. This is how we show up to Advent and this is where God meets us.

#### **December 10**

Second Sunday of Advent Joy in Connection Luke 1:24-45, Isaiah 40:1-11

In community, our joy expands. When we can't rejoice, we can carry each other's joy. That is what Elizabeth and Mary do for each other. The good news begins to take shape for Elizabeth, but scripture tells us that she stays secluded, hiding her pregnancy from others—that is, until Mary arrives at her door, also pregnant. Perhaps Mary's arrival is the moment that changes everything for Elizabeth, for in that moment, her child leaps in her womb and she is filled with the Spirit. She can't help but to rejoice. Through the prophet Isaiah, we hear God speak tender words of comfort; this is the comfort we can give to and receive from each other during this season.

#### December 17

Third Sunday of Advent Joy in Amazement & Wonder Children's Christmas Pageant Luke 1:57-66, Psalm 126

After Elizabeth gives birth, her neighbors and family celebrate with her. When it comes time to name the child, Zechariah affirms the name given by the angel and by Elizabeth. In that moment of affirming the promise, Zechariah's speech is restored. Everyone is filled with awe. How often do you allow yourself to be amazed? Wonder is all around us—can we recognize it? As we learn how to rejoice in a weary world, can we live in a way that allows amazement and wonder to surprise us often? In Psalm 126, those who expect to reap tears are granted a surprise: shouts of joy.

#### December 24

Fourth Sunday of Advent We Sing Stories of Hope Luke 1:46-55, Luke 1:67-80

As soon as Zechariah's voice returns, his first words are gratitude and blessing. He sings a story of praise for God's protection and promise, and then he showers a blessing on his newborn son. He sings a story of hope. After Elizabeth proclaims blessings upon Mary, Mary sings: "My soul magnifies God; my spirit rejoices in God." Mary sings about a God of liberation who pulls the powerful from their thrones and lifts up the lowly. Mary sings a story of hope, one in which justice and joy are interwoven. As we prepare to celebrate Christ's birth, may we also sing stories of hope, justice, and joy.

#### December 24

Christmas Eve

Luke 2:1-20 (and other traditional scriptures)
We Draw the Circle Wide

Luke's Gospel tells us that when Mary gives birth to Jesus, she lays him in a manger, for there was no place for them in the guest room. Scholars argue about where, exactly, the birth occurs—and why. Was it in a stable or the living room of a simple peasant home? Was Bethlehem teeming with visitors who were also there to be counted in the census? Was Joseph's family inhospitable because they disapproved of his marital situation? Regardless of where the birth occurs, we know that Christ is born in a crowded, unlikely place. And yet, God makes a place here anyway. God draws the circle wider as shepherds and unexpected guests arrive. This Christmas, let us also make room—for strangers and neighbors alike. For this is good news of great joy for all people.

#### December 31

First Sunday of Christmas We Root Ourselves in Ritual Luke 2:21-38

After eight days have passed, Mary and Joseph circumcise their child and give him the name Jesus. They return to the temple in Jerusalem to enact the sacred birth rituals of their culture and tradition. While they are doing what is customary, the unexpected occurs. A man named Simeon is led by the Spirit into the temple to proclaim Jesus as the "light of revelation." Then, a prophet named Anna suddenly approaches them; she praises God and speaks about Jesus to everyone longing for redemption. Rituals mark sacred turning points in our lives. They can help us make meaning of celebrations, losses, and transitions. How do our sacred rituals root us and help us live into new chapters with courage?

#### **Youth Activities & Events**

As we end out the year, I have several events planned for the students. First on December 6th, the middle school students will be looking at the Christmas story as the students are reminded of their importance as we examine the humble arrival of Jesus. The high school students will be discussing the Giving Spirit of Christmas, as we examine the importance of giving and to remind them that the greatest gift has already been given to them, Jesus.

On Friday-Saturday, December 8-9 from 7 PM to 7 AM we will be hosting our combined Lock-In at the church. Students are encouraged to bring friends. Parents if you are able to provide food and refreshments for the night that would be amazing. Also, if there is anyone available to help me for the night, that would be appreciated. Or if there are a few of you who want to come for a a few hours throughout the course of the event, that would also be helpful. Students can be picked up at 7 AM Saturday Morning December 9th at church.

On Wednesday December 13th, the theme for each age group will be The Twelve Words of Christmas. We will listen, see, & hear the greatest story ever told. Unseen, but yet long awaited was the voice of God breaking through the darkness and hundreds of years of silence with the cry of a baby. The gift of God.

On December 20th, from 6-8:30 PM we will be meeting for our Christmas Party which is being hosted by Pastor Heather at her home. We will be decorating and enjoying Christmas cookies and will also be participating in a White Elephant Gift Exchange. So be looking for something you need to get rid of from home and wrap it to bring to the party. Also, I am in need of a parent or parents who would provide food for our party on December 20th. If you are able to do that, please let me know as soon as possible.

## **Estate gift inspires kitchen** renovation

Renovation of the church's kitchen renovation had been identified as a necessary project at least a decade ago, but had been postponed several times. When the pipe burst in the out-of-commission kitchenette on Christmas Day last year, the flooding that occurred gave the church the opportunity to address the kitchen project while rebuilding the other damaged areas in that area of the building.

The insurance proceeds that applied to the ruined lower level, fellowship hall, parlor, library, archives, and church offices, did not cover the kitchen. However, an estate gift made by Kolene Dill in 2016 inspired confidence that the uncovered expense for the kitchen could be met.



Kolene was welcomed into membership at 1st Pres in 1987, having moved to Cedar Rapids from Virginia. A widow, Kolene had been born and raised in lowa, but had lived in Virgina after her marriage. Sue Goettel recalls Kolene in the kitchen regularly, serving for funerals,

dinners, fellowship, and monthly for Sunday evening meals with the Golden K's Kiwanis Club.

Kolene was a Meth-Wick resident in 2016 when she died at age 97. She thoughtfully and joyfully included a gift in her estate for kitchen renovation, which has been invested since that time in the church's endowment. Generous gifts from other members, and memorials for Eric Stark, have also made this project possible. With Kolene's legacy gift as a start, and confidence that members would join together to support this part of our life together, 1st Pres' ministries from our kitchen will commence in the new year

## **Born Into a Messy World**

When it comes to the Christmas story, it was a messy plan designed by God to bring his Son into this world. But where does God send His Son, the King of Kings, Lord of Lords? To a barn, a stable. Certainly no place fit for a king. However, Jesus was no ordinary king. When I say it was messy, that is what a barn is. Full of animals and animal stuff. A place so lowly for humans, much less a place for the King of Kings to be born.

Jesus was born in a barn, born into a messy place, the world. He did so because the shepherd was coming to take care of the sheep, preparing a way home for them. An angel appeared in the field to the shepherds saying, "This will be a sign to you, you will find the babe wrapped in cloths and laying in a manger. But really, what was the sign?

Perhaps it was a sign to signify that Jesus was available to each of us. A sign that the God who owns the cattle on a thousand hills, can relate to a homeless person. Because Jesus really never had a home, never actually had a place to rest his head. It was actually a sign for us.

The Apostle Paul instructs us that we should have the same attitude as Christ Jesus, although he was the very nature of God, did not consider equality with God to be grasped, but that he made himself to be nothing. He became a human servant and was made in human likeness.

Being a servant is messy and Jesus set an incredible example for us. He got on his knees and washed feet; he was the God of the universe who was laid in a manger, in a feeding trough of all places. Why was he born into such a messy place? Because he was following a messy plan.

That first Christmas was dirty, it was grimy, it was filthy, but thank God that it was. Because without it, what a mess our lives would be in.

May peace wrap its arms around you, may your heart be filled with wonder, may you and your family be filled with happiness and joy.
