The story goes that there was once an old monastery tucked away in the middle of a forest. For many years people would make the significant effort required to seek out this monastery. The peaceful spirit of the place was healing for the soul. In recent years, however, fewer and fewer people were making their way to the monastery. The monks had grown jealous and petty in their relationships with one another, and this animosity began to be felt by those who visited.

The abbot of the monastery was distressed by what was happening and poured out his heart to a wise old Jewish rabbi who came for a week of solitude and prayer in a nearby cottage in the woods. Having heard the abbot's tale of woe, he asked if he could offer a suggestion. "Please do" responded the abbot. "Anything you can offer."

The rabbi said that he had received a vision while the abbot was pouring out his heart, and the vision was this: "The Messiah is among you." The abbot was astounded. Someone among his own community was the Messiah! Who could it be? He knew it wasn't him, but who? He hastened back to the monastery and shared the news with his fellow monks.

The monks grew silent as they looked at each other. Was this one the Messiah? Or was it that one? Or perhaps it was...? From that day on, the mood in the monastery changed. They began to treat each other with extraordinary respect. Jacob and Johannes started speaking to each other again, neither wanting to be guilty of slighting the Messiah. Paolo and Matthias left behind their frosty anger and sought out each other's forgiveness. The monks began looking for little

ways of serving each other, opportunities to assist, seeking healing and forgiveness where offense had been given.

One traveler, then another began to find their way to the monastery. Word soon spread about the remarkable new spirit of the place. People found themselves renewed and transformed. They sensed a new spirit, the aura of extraordinary respect that now began to surround the old monks, and seemed to radiate out from them and permeate the atmosphere of the abbey. All because those monks knew the Messiah was among them...

This story is a simple one, told and retold many times, but as we enter this season of Easter, I think it is important to remember that while the resurrection was a moment, Easter is on-going and is reflected in a changed way of living, in transformed lives, in new community. In the upcoming weeks, we'll have a variety of opportunities to reflect on the transformation wrought by the echoes of Easter. Pastor Stasia will be inviting members and friends of the church into deeper discipleship. Father Michael Lapsley will share his amazing story of healing and reconciliation. And I will be preaching on some of the epistles (the letters found in the New Testament) as we see how resurrection reality transformed lives and created communities. I look forward to you joining us!

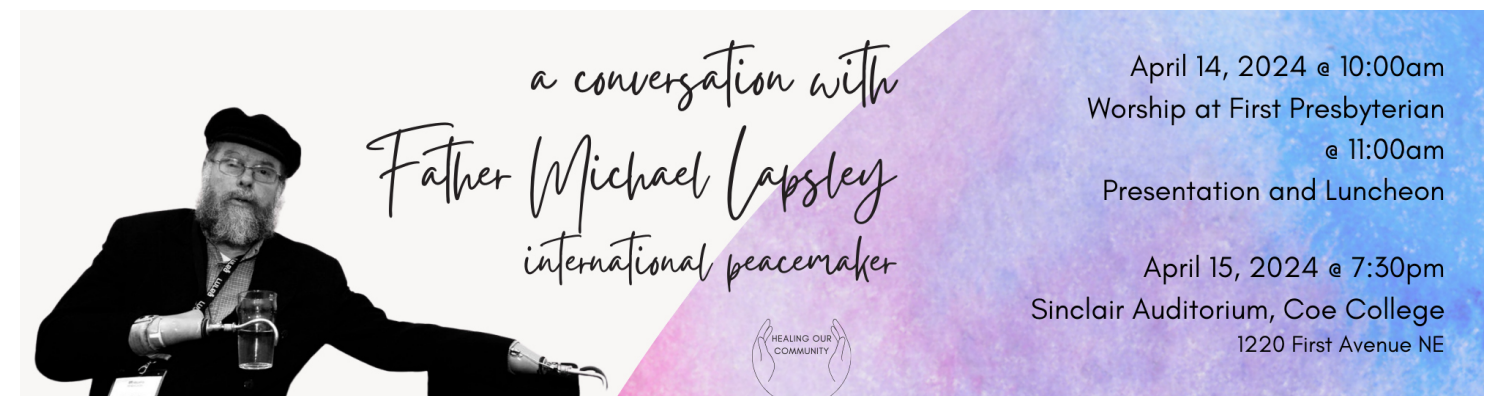
Healing Our Community: Racial Reconciliation Through the Sharing of Stories

April 15, 2024, 7:30PM

Sinclair Auditorium, Coe College

You are invited to Sinclair Auditorium, on the campus of Coe College, April 15th at 7:30pm for an evening with international peacemaker, Father Michael Lapsley. Father Michael works across the globe to create opportunities for healing in the midst of conflict through the sharing of stories. Lapsley's own personal story as an anti-apartheid leader in South Africa is riveting. In 1990, three months after ANC leader Nelson Mandela's release from prison, Lapsley was sent a letter bomb by the apartheid regime. He was blinded in one eye, and lost both hands when he opened the package. After a long recovery from the bombing, Father Lapsley chose to dedicate his life to helping victims of emotional, psychological, and spiritual wounds, inflicted by war, human rights abuses, and other traumatic circumstances. He founded the Institute for Healing of Memories in South Africa in 1998. The institute's mission is to facilitate the healing process of individuals, communities, and nations.

Additionally, Father Michael will be meeting with city leaders, faith leaders in our community, and pastors from around East Iowa encouraging us in our own journey to find pathways of reconciliation and recovery from the wounds of racism. New Life, Same Promises

As we continue to celebrate the risen Christ, we are reminded of the new life that He gives to each of us through His sacrifice and death on the cross. Through the resurrection of Jesus we will find that He is all we need. Through His death and resurrection we are also reminded of His promises. Jesus promises us that if we stumble, we will not fall. We have been saved by His grace, our sins are forgiven, we are redeemed, we are cleansed from anything impure. If the Son sets us free, we are free indeed. Jesus was beaten so that you could be whole. Jesus was whipped so that you could be healed. Jesus says that if we ask for His wisdom, it shall be given to us. Jesus proclaims "I am love" "I am truth" "I am joy" I am all of these things. This is what He promises us.

The most important thing to understand about His promises is that His promises have way more to do with who He is and what He can do for each of us. We need to understand that what God promises us is not just simply the things that He can give us. God gives Himself completely to us. There will be moments in your life when you will say, "If you would just do this for me" or "if you would just do that for me". Where is this language coming from? The enemy lies in waiting, telling us, "If you do this for me then you're God" "If you do that for me, then you're God". Session Notes

Financials:

January reports were received, accepted, and discussed. Pastor Hayes reported for the Administration Commission that an insurance carrier for church property insurance continues to be sought, Treasurer Ryan Buresh is monitoring cash flow as it relates to the two remaining loan payments to Wells Fargo, and the expense for parts and modifications to the Fujitsu HVAC units. There will be timing issues with pledge payments for the “Standing on Promises” campaign for the Wells loan, especially in 2025. Ryan is exploring a refinance plan with the Presbyterian Foundation, the new loan to possibly include the HVAC costs.

The following were elected to serve in 2024 as the corporation officers: President, Sue Latham, vice president, Thomas W. Lackner, secretary, Constance Richardson, and treasurer, Ryan Buresh.

Approval was given for the Endowment and Memorial Committee to hold the first *Little Muddy Legacy Society* luncheon on July 17 at the Clark Alumni House on the Coe College campus, with Jack Evans as the keynote speaker. Evans is the chairman of the board of the Hall-Perrine Foundation, a life-trustee of Coe College, and a past member of the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago.

Commission Check-in:

Care - Shari Stewart referred members to the distributed January meeting minutes. Highlights include the decision to present a gift to the visiting composer of jazz mass, which is to be performed on February 25 by the combined Kirkwood Choir and our Sanctuary Choir. Stasia will choose and order a welcome table for the Gathering Space. Martha and Stasia will coordinate the Ash Wednesday Soup Supper on February 14, with the youth serving. Easter service will be at the regular time, 10:00, with an Easter egg hunt following and breakfast prior. Marta reported a need for additional kitchen help for fellowship events that include meals.

Discipleship - Lenten small groups are successfully being formed using the Adam Hamilton book and/or video “Simon Peter: Flowed but Faithful Disciple.” Insight will use a program from Appian Way media, two creative opportunities will be offered to adults after worship during Lent, one series by retired Marion Presbyterian pastor Howard Chapman and the other by Marty Brown. Howard’s is an introduction to watercolor techniques and Marty’s group will create church banners using resist painting. VBS, an evening program July 15-19, will use the theme ‘Hero Hotline: Called Together to Serve God!’ and Stasia will ensure other churches are aware and invited to participate. The commission will develop a year-round stewardship plan to encompass body, earth, talents, and finances, and work actively with the Administration Commission on the annual financial campaign.

Proclamation - Alisa Shields reported general rave reviews for the Kirkwood Choir mass, that the commission is planning for FPC to participate in the city’s farmer’s market with booth in on 3rd Street with face painting and information, especially about VBS. No items can be sold by the church.

Administration - In addition to the Finance report, Tom Lackner directed members to the minutes. Highlights include that Darlene Elbert is concluding enlistment of volunteers for the front desk, the goal to document the building equipment, systems, and renovations as much as possible, that Greater Works Church will continue to use our church and a new contract needs to be negotiated and signed, the stove/ovens in the kitchen need repairs, the audio system in the sanctuary is failing and estimates for repair will be initiated, and the janitorial service for the church is in transition: former staff has resigned, and Stan is filling in temporarily.

Pastor’s Report- Rev. Hayes thanked everyone for their dedication and hard work, citing their love of the church and their attention to all who attend.

Go Deeper: Christian Thought in a Changing World - Dessert or Hot Beverage Book Group

“ After several opportunities to read and discuss books with members of our church, I relish the opportunity to question what I believe, experience another point of view, and ponder where I need to go next. Quite honestly, friendships resulting from book discussions are another perk! I’m looking forward to a deeper discussion of Christian thought.” - Cindy Monroe

Dear Church Family,

My heart’s longing is for each member of every church to experience the joy of being discipled by another person of faith. I know when I was a teenager I had a hunger for spiritual growth that couldn’t find a source of nourishment that was as deep as I needed. I was later blessed to attend a Christian college where more than one professor took me under his or her wing and walked beside me in faith and I felt fed.

Over the last couple of years I have been pondering what a good discipleship program could look like at First Presbyterian Church. Discipleship is multi-faceted, it includes inviting others to do ministry with you, expanding one’s spiritual lens, practicing spiritual disciplines like prayer and Bible study, and for me encountering rich resources of Christian thought. At a church it can look like two people serving side-by-side, a linear education program, a Christian thought lecture series, or a time of fellowship, coffee, and spiritual strengthening through mutual vulnerability. There are a lot of options; just like there are a variety of persons, there are a variety of pathways for discipleship.

Both Pastor Heather and I would like to share with you an opportunity to engage in Christian thought through the reading of Christian literature. We have selected fourteen books, listed below, for those who are interested, to engage in however feels most welcoming to you. Perhaps you want to read these books on your own and journal your thoughts as you engage with the writer individually. Or maybe you want to read a book from this list and then meet with one of us to discuss the book and how God has spoken to you through it. Or maybe you would like to join a group for discussion of the book – either a group of friends that you coordinate yourself or a discussion group facilitated by either Heather or me. Our plan is to offer a discussion on one book each month, as listed below. If you are interested in this, please email me at Stasia@fpccr.org to let me know of

your availability in May for the first discussion. I am trying to decide what day and time this will take place. The two possibilities I’m considering for the first book are Friday, May 17th at 7 p.m. OR Thursday, May 23rd at 10:30 a.m., but I am open to other options based upon interest.

I also want to offer to meet with anyone one-on-one to talk about matters of faith. I want to listen to you and cheer you on and offer resources that might be an encouragement or a positive challenge. Feel free to reach out to me if this sounds inviting to you.

You are invited to enter into a journey of going deeper and wider in Christian thought. I hope you will consider what this might look like for you.

MAPPING INEQUALITY: REDLINING IN IOWA

Presenter: Sydney O'Hare, Museum Educator,
African American Museum of Iowa

Redlining is the systematic denial of various services by federal and local government agencies and the private sector to residents of specific neighborhoods. Black populations in seven Iowa cities were subject to redline mapping. The US federal government established the National Housing Act of 1934 as a way to save the crashing national housing industry during The Great Depression. Under the act, Congress established the Home Owners’ Loan Corporation (HOLC) that oversaw federal mortgage and loan guidelines. Over 200 US urban areas were appraised based on a list of criteria, including race and ethnicity, creating color-coded HOLC maps to distinguish areas of mortgage loan risks. Typically, those with a high Black population were marked red and deemed hazardous or undesirable. This practice led to urban segregated neighborhoods and poor housing conditions. The lasting effects are seen in the racial wealth gap and police violence seen today.
