Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us. 1 John 4:7-12

When my children were younger, each of them spent a number of years learning violin according to the Suzuki method. Which means that I at any given moment I can hum a number of variations of Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star, as well as Lightly Row, Song of the Wind and O Come, Little Children. The reason I can do this, is that our teacher had these practice charts that had 100 little spaces, each ready to be filled with a sticker, stamp or star. The girls could fill out one of those charts by playing a song 100 times. It was a lot of Twinkles. But the idea behind the charts really wasn't any different than a truth that many of us already know. That you need to practice a skill not once, not twice, but many, many times to master it. And at some point in time during your repetitions, memory or muscle memory takes over and creates a certain ease with which to accomplish your new skill. It becomes second nature and you don't even really need to think. This is as true with a cartwheel on beam or solving a mathematical equation or a perfect soccer shot on goal as it is with seamlessly playing a tricky bit of music.

Which makes me wonder- what about the human heart?

Do our hearts have muscle memory?

I would suggest that this is the heart of the Christian journey - a life time of practicing what it means to love. Choosing again each day as we wake up to approach others and our world through a lens of care and compassion. Or as Thomas Merton puts it, "our job is to love others without stopping to inquire whether or not they are worthy...this love itself will render both ourselves and our neighbors worthy." Our own experience of salvation is tied deeply to the lives and salvation of others. Just as love can change everything for the receiver, it also changes everything for the giver. And as we again and again engage in these acts of love we are creating a muscle memory for our own hearts.

This is a bit of what we do here in the church. We practice loving. Through activities such as mission trips and youth conferences, through Sunday Evening Meals and food pantry work, when we serve meals with NMEP or sit with a kid for a morning during Reading Camp, through standing with one another in sorrow and difficulty, through working with each other on committees and making decisions together. And doing that all in a spirit of love. Practicing and encouraging each other and running together hand in hand toward the finish.

What is the difference between those who experience the joy of the kingdom that God has created for us and those that do not?

One thing - love

Love changes everything.



Stewardship moment

What are you willing to give up for the Kingdom of God? A recent Godly Play Sunday School lesson focused on two simple verses from the New Testament, Matthew 13:45-46. "Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant seeking beautiful pearls, who, when he had found one pearl of great price, went and sold all that he had and bought it." In the telling of this story to the children, the frame of a home is laid out on a felt underlay. This home is filled with pictures of various items one would find in a home. A picture of the merchant who owns this home is also set out. As the story is visually illustrated this merchant goes out and looks at various pearls until he comes across one pearl that stands out above the rest. He tries to purchase this pearl with some money, but is unsuccessful. He doesn't have enough money. Then he offers to sell his furniture in addition to offering money, but the offer is turned down. Then he offers some precious heirlooms and these are turned down as well. Finally, he offers everything he owns, including his home, and he is able to purchase the pearl. As the storyteller hands over the frame of the house to the seller, the kids are astounded and respond, "He even sells his house!" The storyteller responds, "This pearl must be very valuable."

This parable told in this way reveals how little, in regard to material possessions, most of us are willing to give for the Kingdom of God. What, if anything, have we sacrificed? Do we believe the Kingdom of God is worth so little?

What does it mean for us to be stewards of what God has placed in our trust? In light of this parable, do we need to think again about how we give, save, and spend our resources?
