Perhaps you've heard the analogy of a journey to describe Lent. Metaphorically, we "walk" alongside Jesus from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday as he goes from his ministry, to the Upper Room, to the Cross, and then to new life again. In that journey of discipleship, many Christians come to find a deeper sense of knowing God and knowing self. This particular year, we will be using the images of wilderness to evoke those many stories in the life of Jesus and in history of God's people where the journey led through unfamiliar and sometimes harsh landscapes.

Our own journeys through wilderness can take many different forms. Sometimes they are metaphorical as we experience changing circumstances in our lives. Additions or losses that create unfamiliar terrain for our days. Sometimes our wilderness can be spiritual, as we experience a season of dryness of spirit and the feeling of being far from God's presence. There are many in our world are on a more literal journey, having been displaced from their homes by warfare or violence or poverty.

Yet even our times in the wilderness can be fruitful as we discover new vision, are shaken from complacency, invited into mystery, and find surprising companionship along the way. During Lent, I encourage you to join this journey that is both metaphorical and literal, as we study Biblical texts of alienation and hospitality, of barrenness and rebirth, finding ourselves part of a long story that has always been leading to home for all.

"The Gift of Revelation" | Scripture: Luke 9:28-43a

The story of the Transfiguration closes out the season of Epiphany, a season where we are offered the gifts of God bathed in light. The story of the transfiguration offers the disciples one of those rare moments of clarity, seeing Jesus for exactly who he is. This otherworldly moment is a balance to the grittiness of all that exists "down in the valley" yet both are needed for the whole expression of who Jesus is - and who we are.

Preaching in Lent: Wilderness

Lent begins in the wilderness. The Spirit guides Jesus into the wilderness where he comes face to face with temptation and struggle. Yet, in his forty days of fasting, resisting, and wandering, Jesus is shaped and formed for his ministry. Similarly, through the wilderness of Lent, we are invited to surrender to the leadings of the Spirit. Hopefully through our wandering we remember who we are and whose we are, and the wilderness can become sacred. Despite its sometimes harsh setting, we remember that God is the one that makes even the deserts bloom. This Lent, we welcome you to the journey.

March 9th

"Wilderness Beginnings"
Scripture: Matthew 4:1-11| Jesus is tempted

Youth Sunday

The young people of our congregation will be assisting in worship leadership this morning as we hear of Jesus' time in the wilderness at the beginning of his ministry and consider the ways we are all called to be the body of Christ.

March 16th

"The Wild Spirit"

Scripture: John 3:1-17 | *Nicodemus visits in the dark* It can be particularly hard for those of us who think very concretely to be able to let go and truly experience this wilderness where the Spirit has led us. Nicodemus is one such thinker, and he tries so hard to understand that he ends up missing the point. This week we hold the shifting nature of God: both abstract and concrete, both incomprehensible and simple.

March 23rd

"Companions Along the Way" | Scripture: John 4:5-42
The Samaritan woman meets Jesus at the well
Preaching: Rev Seth Normington, Transitional
Presbyter, Presbytery of East Iowa

It is easy to think of the wilderness as a place of loneliness. In the hardest parts of our lives, we often feel like we are going at it alone. In fact, it is all too easy (and all too common) for us to isolate ourselves, assuming that others are enemies—or at least would never be our friends. Sometimes it takes a wilderness encounter, outside of our typical lives, to break us out of our patterns.

March 30th

"New Vision" | Scripture: John 9:1-41 The man born blind regains his sight

While this passage is about a miraculous healing, it is also not about that healing at all. Confusion about the blind man, how he was healed, and what power Jesus wields is central to the story. What is clear is that Jesus is disrupting the order that the community knows so well in an attempt to help them see the world in a new way.

April 6th

"Life Finds a Way" | Scripture: John 11:1-45
Lazarus is raised from the dead

We don't expect life in the wilderness. It is easy to think of the wilderness as empty, barren, dead. But the truth is: there is life in wilderness, in desert, in the arctic. In every place we dismiss as hopeless, there is life. Just as the resurrection of Lazarus changed the perspective of those who witnessed it, this account of the miracle begins to introduce us, even before Easter, to one of the central ideas of Christianity: death does not have the final word.

April 13th | Palm Sunday

Scripture: Matthew 21:1-11

Join us for palm frond procession and the Chancel Choir's presentation of selections from Handel's Messiah.

April 20th | Easter Sunday

Scripture: John 20:1-18, Psalm 46

With song and scripture we celebrate our resurrection hope, yet the end of our wilderness wanderings is only the beginning of a new story. For the next 40 days Jesus makes appearances. Showing up. Teaching. Revealing. Communing. Jesus is also preparing. Preparing them for his ascension. His disciples will stay in the world. But they won't be alone. God's Spirit is coming.

Journey to Calling a Second Pastor

At this year's annual meeting, the Session shared an important step in our church's future—we are moving forward with the process of calling and installing a second pastor. As we continue to rebuild from the challenges of the pandemic and flooding, we see new opportunities for growth, renewal, and strengthened ministry. Additional pastoral leadership will help us embrace this next chapter with faith and vision. As we embark on this journey, we commit ourselves to seeking God's will with patience, trust, and prayer.

The Steps in the Search Process:

- 1. Preparation: Our Vision Team has already laid the groundwork by gathering insights from last fall's Celebration Sunday, and this will be added to information gleaned from Lenten Small Group conversations and the Holy Cow! Congregational Assessment. These reflections on our needs and vision will guide the search and help potential candidates understand who we are.
- **2. Form the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC):** The congregation elects a PNC to lead the search process. This dedicated group represents the voices of the church and works to find a pastor who aligns with our mission and vision. In the coming weeks, our Nominating Committee will present a slate of candidates for election.
- **3. Discernment and Seeking Candidates:** With guidance from the presbytery, the PNC will create a Ministry Information Form (MIF) that describes our congregation and pastoral needs. This profile will be shared with potential candidates, and the committee will prayerfully review applications, conduct interviews, and listen to sermons. Pastor Heather may provide insights if requested, but the PNC will make independent decisions.
- **4. Final Selection and Call:** After much discernment, the PNC will select a candidate and present them to the Session and congregation. The candidate will preach for the church, followed by a congregational vote to extend the call. If approved, the pastor will accept the call and be officially installed in a special worship service, marking the beginning of a new pastoral relationship.

The Role of the Congregation: While the PNC leads the search, every member of our church plays a vital role. Your prayers, patience, and engagement are essential. Stay connected through newsletters and announcements, and trust in God's guidance through this exciting journey. May this season be one of joy and hope as we look forward to the future God has prepared for us.

What is a Sabbatical? A Time For Renewal

In February, the Session voted to grant Pastor Heather a sabbatical leave to be taken in the year 2026. Over the next year, plans for that time for renewal will be developed by Heather in conversation with the Session, including the application for some grant funding to support the time away.

Sabbatical Leave is an extension of the Biblical concept of the Sabbath day and Sabbath year for renewal and education. It is both an act of faith that God will sustain us through a period of reflection and changed activity and an occasion for recovery and renewal of vital energies for both the pastor and the congregation. This "extended time" is qualitatively different from "vacation" or "days off" in that it provides an opportunity for the individual to strategically disengage from regular and normal tasks so that ministry and mission may be viewed from a new perspective. It is our hope that this provides of time of renewal both for Heather and for the entire congregation.
