Elijah meets Elisha and passes his role as God's prophet on to the succeeding generation.

APNC Search Update

The search for an Associate Pastor continues this month as we elect an APNC (associate pastor nominating committee) on May 4th during a congregational meeting following worship. Once elected this group will take over and direct the search for our second pastor.

The first order of business for the committee will be to create the MDP (ministry description profile), a document that describes the position, our congregation, our vision for ministry, and our community. To create this document, the APNC will be able to use congregational input gathered through church and small group gatherings, the recent HolyCow! Survey, and demographic information. The MDP will be submitted for approval to the Session and then to the Presbytery. Upon approval it can be uploaded to the PCUSA church leadership connection database and distributed through other channels.

At that time, the work will turn to receiving and reading resumes, listening to sermons, interviewing candidates, and prayerfully discerning the best fit. At the conclusion of the search, the committee will present a candidate to the congregation and the congregation will have the choice as to whether or not to extend a call. Watch for updates in newsletters, emails and bulletins as this process continues, and continue to keep the work of the APNC in your prayers.

Border Encounter: Educational Mission Trip October 27 – 31, 2025

Important Reminder: Protect Yourself from Scam Emails and Texts

Unfortunately, in recent months, churches across the country — including ours — have been targeted by email and text message scams. These messages often appear to come from the pastor, a staff member, or another trusted church leader, asking for money, gift cards, or urgent favors.

We want to help you recognize and avoid these scams. Here are a few important reminders:

We will never ask for gift cards, wire transfers, or personal financial information via email or text. If you receive a message like this, it is a scam.

Double-check the sender's email address or phone number. Scammers often use addresses or numbers that look similar but are slightly off. Official church emails always come from @fpccr.org

If you are unsure whether a message is legitimate, contact me directly. Call me at 319-899-0094 (even if the message says I am unavailable or busy)-or email stormy@fpccr.org before responding.

Do not click on suspicious links or attachments and do not provide any personal information in response to an unusual request.

Report suspicious messages to the church office. We can help confirm if it's legitimate and, if necessary, alert others to be cautious.

As always, we want our community to be a place of trust, care, and connection. Staying vigilant together helps keep it that way.

FAQ Sabbatical

What's a sabbatical?

A clergy sabbatical is a time for pastors to step away from their usual responsibilities for rest, renewal, and spiritual refreshment. It's usually taken after several years of service and might include things like travel, study, or simply time to reconnect with God and recharge. The goal is to come back to ministry with fresh energy and perspective. In the long run, both the pastor and the congregation benefit from the break. Pastor Heather has been serving at FPC in some capacity since 2009 and 2025 marks her 30th year of ordained ministry serving churches throughout lowa. She is looking forward to some time to intentionally fill her cup and renew herself for continued service to the church.

When does Heather plan to take her sabbatical?

The anticipated dates will occur in the late spring (after Easter) and summer of 2026.

Who will be preaching/leading the church while Heather is away?

At the current moment there are two potential answers to this question. First, if our Associate Pastor search is successful over the next six months or so, we might anticipate that the new associate would serve alongside Pastor Heather for the beginning of 2026 and then provide preaching and pastoral leadership while she is gone. This would be an ideal time for our congregation to connect with and embrace the leadership of the newest member of our pastoral staff. Second, if the Associate Pastor search has not yet born fruit by the end of the year, the Session and Pastor Heather will work to find alternatives for preaching and pastoral care from among other clergy colleagues. This would impact the scope and timing of the sabbatical and/or might push it to a later year.

What will Heather be doing while she's gone?

The simple answer is: hike as much of the Appalachian trail as she can. The longer answer might include such things as: engaging in a prayerful daily rhythm for weeks on end; disconnecting from the virtual world and reconnecting with God's good creation; recommitting to healthy physical practices and exploring the abilities and limits of her body; spending time with family as they are able to join her on the trail for a few days or a week; having conversations with disparate people from Georgia to Maine, looking for places of shared connection and potential hope in these divided times; filling her preaching tank with lots of stories to share upon her return.

How long will the sabbatical last?

Again, this is connected to the results of the Associate Pastor search. Walking the Appalachian Trail from Springer Mountain, Georgia to Mt. Katahdin, Maine could take an estimated 20-21 weeks. If an associate is not in place, a decision would need to be made as to whether a shorter 12 week sabbatical or a postponement would be be the best option.

How will we pay for this?

The Session has created a budgetary plan for the additional Associate Pastor position. In addition, First Pres has submitted an application for a Lilly Foundation Clergy Renewal Grant. This grant can be used to pay for pastoral support and congregational activities while the pastor is absent from the congregation as well as for expenses the pastor may incur. We will find out whether or not our application has been successful on August 29, 2025.

Wait, congregational activities? What are we doing?

While a pastor is on sabbatical, it is often a time of renewal for the congregation also. A congregation might choose to host a kick-off and/or welcome back event. There may be mirroring activities - like an opportunity for hikes throughout the summer (think Mt. Trashmore or Indian Creek) or following along where Pastor Heather is on trail. As we determine if the grant is received in August, we can form a group to make appropriate plans for the congregation during this time.

Can we get a hold of Heather in case of emergency?

As a rule, there is no contact between a pastor and the congregation while they are on sabbatical and Pastor Heather will be pretty disconnected on the trail. She will however, be wearing a satellite emergency tracking device which also allows her to send out texts and have some contact with a limited number of people. Before leaving, everything will be put into place so that the congregation will be well cared for and able to address all concerns.

Watch for more of these FAQ's as we move closer to 2026 and more details get nailed down. If you have a question/concern you would like addressed, reach out to Pastor Heather or a member of the Session and we'll get them answered in the next round.
