From the Pastor

Summer is a season that beckons us outside: into gardens and parks, onto hiking trails and beaches, and even into quiet moments on porches as the sun sets late. These spaces—far from pews and stained-glass windows—are not separate from our life of faith. They can be sacred places where we deepen our relationship with God and one another.

Throughout scripture, we find that God's presence is not limited to temples or sanctuaries. When Jacob fled into the wilderness, he laid his head on a stone and dreamed of a ladder reaching to heaven. Waking up, he exclaimed, "Surely the Lord is in this place—and I did not know it!" (Genesis 28:16). Likewise, Jesus taught on hillsides and along seashores, meeting people where they were and revealing God's love in the midst of daily life.

Our faith is not meant to be compartmentalized to one hour on Sunday morning. It is meant to infuse every aspect of our lives. In Romans 12:1, Paul urges believers to "present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship." This call reminds us that the way we live, move, and interact with the world can be an act of devotion.

This summer, as you find yourself in new places and rhythms, consider these ways to grow your faith beyond the sanctuary:

Practice Gratitude Outdoors

Take moments to pause and thank God for the beauty you encounter—whether a breathtaking

sunset, the laughter of children at play, or the quiet peace of a morning breeze.

Bring Scripture Along

Read a psalm or listen to a devotional podcast while sitting by a lake or walking a trail. Let God's word accompany your steps.

Pray Creatively

Use what you see to guide your prayers: pray for peace as you watch flowing water; pray for resilience as you notice strong trees; pray for the flourishing of all people as you witness the diversity of God's creation.

Keep a Summer Journal

Jot down where you notice God at work each day or week. Reflect on what these moments teach you about trust, wonder, or gratitude.

Extend Hospitality on the Go

Summer brings travel and encounters with new people. Practice kindness to strangers, recognizing each interaction as an opportunity to embody Christ's love.

By intentionally weaving faith into our summer activities, we remember that church is not just a building—it's the people of God, living as Christ's hands and feet in the world. May this season deepen your awareness that wherever you go, God goes with you. And may you return to our gathered worship with stories of grace, joy, and transformation.

Blowing in the Wind

How many times must we ask the same questions before we hear the truth? Join us as we explore Bob Dylan's "Blowin' in the Wind" alongside Ecclesiastes' timeless reflections on life's mysteries and Jesus' invitation to be born of the Spirit. Together, we'll wonder how God calls us to live faithfully when answers seem elusive and the wind of the Spirit is our only guide.

August 3: Joshua 24:14-18, Galatians 5:13-14

Gotta Serve Somebody

What does true worship look like when the world is broken? Dylan's songs "The Death of Emmett Till" and "Hurricane" cry out against racial injustice past and present. This Sunday, we turn to Isaiah's call to loose the bonds of injustice and Jesus' mission to set captives free—hearing how God calls the church to lament, confront sin, and work for a more just world.

August 17: Isaiah 43:16-21, Mark 2:18-22

The Times They Are A Changin'

How do we respond when the world shifts beneath our feet? Dylan's "The Times They Are A-Changin'" invites us to face change with courage. We'll hear Isaiah's promise of God doing a new thing and Jesus' challenge to embrace new wineskins, as we consider how God invites us into holy adaptation in a changing world.

August 24: Romans 8:18–25, Revelation 21:1–5

I Shall Be Released

How long must we wait for freedom? Dylan's "I Shall Be Released" echoes creation's groaning for redemption. This week, we'll reflect on Paul's hope for glory beyond suffering and John's vision of a new heaven and earth, finding strength in God's promise that release, healing, and renewal are on the way.

August 31: TBD

What does it mean to grow in faith while staying "forever young" in spirit? On this Labor Day weekend, we'll explore Dylan's heartfelt blessing and God's call to lifelong growth. Together we'll celebrate how we are blessed to be a blessing, leaving a legacy of faith through our work, relationships, and commitment to love across the generations.

From the Youth Director

A young man was eager to grow in his Christian life. He got a piece of paper and made a list of all the things he would do for God. He wrote down the things he would give up, the places he would go to minister and the area of ministry he would enter. He was excited. He took the list to church and put it on the altar. He thought he would feel joy, but instead he felt empty. So he went home and started adding to his list. He wrote down more things he would do and wouldn't do. He took the longer list and placed it on the altar, but still felt nothing.

Each person's list of the things they want to accomplish spiritually is not going to look the same. My area of ministry is also my job, which is to help young people understand Jesus and help them grow in a relationship with Him. When they understand and know Jesus, they will see Him in their lives and know how to live their lives as He desires. Growing in faith isn't just making lists of things we will do or won't do and placing them before Jesus.

To grow in our faith, we must deepen our relationship with God and this often involves removing the things we are most comfortable with in our lives, or fasting, or even spending moment's each day in devotion. Our faith is about getting closer to God, and it means the steps you take may not look the same as mine. God knows where you are in your journey and it's important for you and I to be faithful in the guidance God provides for our spiritual growth. The more we take those steps in our growth process, the easier it becomes for us to find ourselves closer to Jesus

I hope and pray that you may continue to seek Him and share your spiritual practices with those close to you so they may see and learn how to grow spiritually. I hope that you continue to grow in His grace as you grow spiritually closer to Him.

Border Encounter: Educational Mission Trip October 27 – 31, 2025
