Sermons in January & February

January 4

In the Beginning...

John 1:1-14

John's gospel goes back to the beginning and reinterprets the world's unfolding through the light of Christ.

January 11

Guest Preacher

Epiphany Series: Drawn Into The Light

During the season of Epiphany, we follow the light of Christ as it draws us deeper into faith, reshapes our community, and clarifies our calling. In these weeks, scripture moves us from the first invitation to follow Jesus, through the surprising wisdom of the cross, and toward a vision of God's glory that both inspires and sends us. Along the way, the apostle Paul reminds us that the church's life is not grounded in human strength or certainty, but in grace, humility, and the power of the Spirit at work among us. As we approach Lent, this series invites us to see more clearly who Christ is—and who we are becoming together.

January 18

Named by Grace

John 1:29–42 | 1 Corinthians 1:1–9

Before the disciples follow Jesus, they are first named, known, and invited. This Sunday we begin Epiphany by remembering that our faith starts not with what we do, but with God's grace already at work in us.

January 25

Re-centered by the Call

Matthew 4:12–23 | 1 Corinthians 1:10–18

Jesus' call disrupts old loyalties and reorders our lives around something deeper. As Paul challenges a divided church, we reflect on what it means to be centered in Christ rather than our preferences, personalities, or fears.

February 1

Re-oriented by Upside-Down Wisdom

Matthew 5:1–12 | 1 Corinthians 1:18–31

Paul tells us that wisdom looks like foolishness to the world, but it is the power and wisdom of God. This Sunday, let's ask: What does it mean to re-orient our lives around a wisdom that the world calls foolish?

February 8

Installation of Rev. Anna Sheetz

Living the Light Together

Matthew 5:13–20 | 1 Corinthians 2:1–12

What does a Beatitude-shaped life look like in community? As we install our new associate pastor, we hear Jesus' call to be salt and light—living signs of God's grace through shared ministry and Spirit-led wisdom.

February 15

Transfiguration Sunday

Seeing Glory Clearly

Matthew 17:1–9 | Exodus 24:12–18

On the mountain, the disciples glimpse Christ's glory, but they cannot stay there. As we observe Transfiguration Sunday, we listen again for God's voice calling us to follow Jesus back into the world, ready for the journey toward Lent.



Ash Wednesday: Marking the Beginning of Lent

As winter begins to loosen its grip and the church turns toward Lent, we invite you to mark Ash Wednesday, February 18, on your calendar.

Join us for a simple soup supper at 5:30 p.m., followed by Ash Wednesday worship at 6:15 p.m. This quiet, meaningful service offers space for reflection, prayer, and the imposition of ashes as we remember both our humanity and God's grace.

This year, Ash Wednesday also opens the door to our Lenten theme, *Lent with Lewis: Lessons from Beyond the Wardrobe*—a season shaped by story, imagination, and the invitation to step more deeply into God's transforming love.

Whether you come carrying weariness, curiosity, or hope, you are welcome. Come for supper. Come for worship. Come begin the journey of Lent together.

Small Wonder, Barbara Kingsolver

Small Wonder is a collection of 23 essays on environmentalism and social justice by American novelist and biologist, Barbara Kingsolver. Soulful and soul-searching... a passionate invitation to readers to be part of the crowd that cares about the environment, peace and family.

The Remarkable Ordinary, Frederick Buechner

Pay attention. Listen to the call of a bird or the rush of the wind, to the people who flow in and out of your life. The ordinary points you to the extraordinary God who loves all of creation, including you.

Almost Everything- Notes on Hope, Ann Lamott

Need a little hope in your life right now? In this profound and funny book, Lamott calls for each of us to rediscover the nuggets of hope and wisdom buried within us that can make life sweeter. Divided in short chapters that explore life's essential truths the book pinpoints moments of insight as it shines an encouraging light forward.

Holy Envy – Finding God in the Faith of Others

In an age when religion sometimes seems weaponized, furthering the distance between us in this book Taylor recounts her moving discoveries of finding the sacred in unexpected places while teaching world religions to undergraduates in Baptist-saturated rural Georgia, revealing how God delights in confounding our expectations.

The First Love Story – Adam, Eve and Us, Bruce Feiler

In this fresh retelling of their story, Feiler, travels from the Garden of Eden to the Sistine Chapel, from John Milton's London to Mae West's Hollywood, discovering how Adam and Eve should be hailed as exemplars of a long-term, healthy resilient relationship. At a time of discord and fear over the strength of our social fabric, Feiler shows how history's first couple can again be role models for unity, forgiveness and love.

Looking Ahead: Preparing for the Journey

The turning of the calendar always invites reflection. January gives us a rare pause—space to breathe after the fullness of Advent and Christmas, and time to look ahead with intention. Before us stretches a new year, full of possibility, promise, and trust in what God is still bringing into being.

This year, that sense of looking forward carries special meaning for me. In April, I will begin a sabbatical that includes an attempt to walk the Continental Divide Trail. While that journey will officially begin when my foot meets the trail, the truth is that it has already started. Preparation comes long before departure—researching routes, gathering gear, training my body, and learning what it will take to walk day after day with intention and care.

In much the same way, the season ahead for our congregation is one we are already preparing for together. Now that the busy days of Advent and Christmas are behind us, my focus is turning toward what will help make this a healthy, faithful sabbatical season—for me and for the church. That preparation includes working closely with Anna to ensure she is fully supported and equipped for leadership during my absence; partnering with Session to map out the year ahead; and empowering teams of volunteers to plan and lead our ministries with confidence and creativity.

We are also creating a central space where, as I am able, I can share stories and photos from the trail—small windows into the journey that will keep us connected across the miles.

At its heart, this sabbatical is about renewal. Yes, it will be a physical challenge, but it is also a spiritual one. As part of my preparation, I am creating a simple daily devotional—something to ground my mornings on the trail and keep me attentive to God's presence along the way. That devotional will be shared with the congregation as well, so that those who wish can join me in this season of reflection and renewal, wherever they may be.

Every journey worth taking begins with preparation—with prayer, intention, and trust. As we step into this new year together, may we do so with open hearts, steady hope, and confidence that God goes before us, beside us, and within us—on the trail and at home alike.

Lent With Lewis: Lessons From Beyond the Wardrobe

This Lent, our small groups will be invited into a rich and imaginative journey through *The Chronicles of Narnia* by C. S. Lewis.

Many of us first encountered Narnia as children, through a wardrobe door, a snowy forest, or the quiet strength of Aslan. But these beloved stories also hold deep wisdom for adults navigating faith, doubt, temptation, grace, and hope. During Lent, we'll explore how Lewis's stories can help us reflect on our own spiritual lives and walk more intentionally toward Easter.

Each week, groups will draw from a different book in the series, exploring themes such as temptation, trust, transformation, perseverance, belonging, responsibility, and resurrection hope. Participants will engage with selected passages from the books, paired with Scripture and guided conversation. No one needs to read all seven books, short excerpts and audio listening options will be provided, making this study accessible to all.

This is a study designed for conversation, curiosity, and formation, not literary expertise. Whether you've read Narnia many times, or never at all, you are welcome.

A Word to Potential Leaders

If you've ever thought, "I don't know enough to lead a group," this may be the perfect opportunity. Leaders will be provided with clear weekly guides, discussion questions, and optional spiritual practices. What matters most is not having all the answers, but a willingness to open the door and journey alongside others.

Registration for groups and leaders will open soon. We hope you'll consider stepping through the wardrobe with us this Lent.

Godly Play in the New Year

On Sunday mornings at First Presbyterian Church, our children are invited into a space of wonder, story, and holy curiosity through our Montessori-based Christian education program called Godly Play.

Godly Play honors children as thoughtful spiritual beings. Rather than rushing toward "right answers," it invites them to listen deeply to Scripture, wonder together, and explore how God's story connects with their own lives. Through story, silence, creative response, and conversation, children are encouraged to grow in faith at their own pace.

We currently offer two Godly Play classrooms during worship:

Kindergarten–3rd Grade, led by Miss Allie

4th–5th Grade, led by Miss Glenna

After the children's sermon in worship, kids are escorted upstairs to their classrooms, where they remain for the rest of the service. Parents and caregivers can pick children up directly from their classroom following worship.

In the weeks ahead, lessons will focus on the parables of Jesus, key moments in Jesus' life, and eventually the stories of the early church, helping children build a rich, connected understanding of Scripture and God's unfolding story.

Whether your child is brand new to Sunday School or has been part of the program for years, Godly Play offers a gentle, meaningful way to grow in faith, which incorporates scripture, imagination, and play.

If you have questions about the program or would like to learn more, we're always happy to talk. And if you see our Godly Play storytellers in the hallway, be sure to thank them for the care and creativity they share each week.

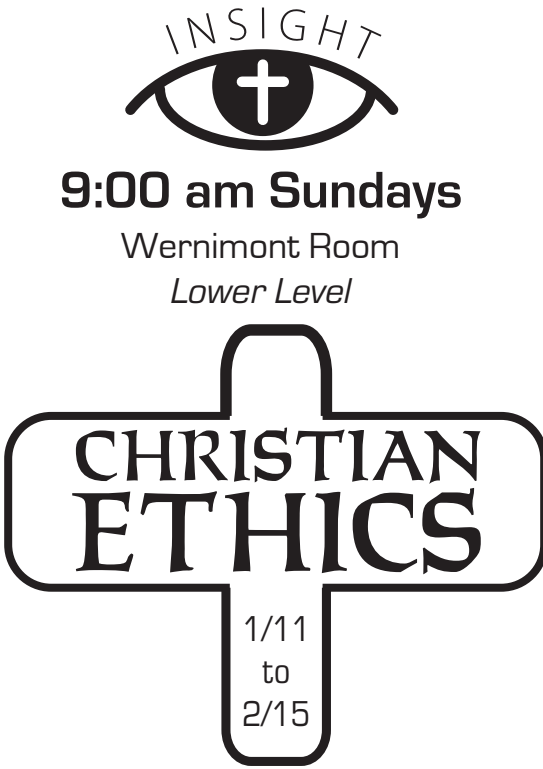

A Small Practice of Hospitality

As our congregation continues to grow and change, we're always looking for simple ways to make First Presbyterian Church feel welcoming, connected, and caring, especially for those who are new among us.

One of those small but powerful practices is wearing name tags on Sunday mornings.

Name tags help newcomers feel at ease. They make it easier to greet one another by name. And they remind us that hospitality isn't just something the church offers, it's something we practice together. In a community as active and multigenerational as ours, name tags help bridge the gap between familiar faces and new ones.

This feels especially important as we welcome Anna Sheetz into her first months of ministry among us. As Anna spends time meeting people, learning names, and getting to know the rhythms of our congregation, name tags are a simple gift we can offer and make those early conversations warmer and more personal.

If you've worn a name tag for years, thank you. If it's been a while, consider picking one up again. And if this is a new habit for you, we invite you to give it a try.

Sometimes hospitality begins with something as simple as a name and the openness to be known.

Youth Summer Mission Trips

This summer both our middle school students and high school students will be embarking on life-changing mission trips.

From June 7th-June 12th the middle school students will be traveling to Columbia Missouri as we serve the community there and the theme being Disability Inclusion and Advocacy. This trip is a mix of hands on service and educational learning opportunities. These middle school students will learn about the concept of disability from a disciples-focused theological perspective as they identify barriers to justice and developing a voice for advocacy and inclusion in their own contexts. Our group will have the opportunity to learn from scholars working in academic disability theology fields, we will work alongside local disability justice advocates, and learning how to create a lens for combating ableism in the church. Our group will develop a better sense of what it means to be equipped in working towards advocacy and inclusion and how we can craft a vision for what that may look like in our own community.

From July 25th to August 1st our high school students will be traveling to Fort Collins, Colorado as we serve the community there with the theme being Housing Justice. This trip is also a mix of hands-on service and educational learning opportunities. Our group will learn how housing and homelessness affect real people. Our group will participate in many various opportunities which may include: helping to build an affordable housing unit, sharing meals in a home that provides housing for adults with disabilities, serving food to the unhoused, or working to support families experiencing homelessness in a variety of ways. Our group will experience and explore topics we will learn about that are relevant to our very own community. We will be able to develop tangible plans that we can bring home to implement in our own community as we seek to serve our neighbors and to become advocates for compassion, equity, and lasting change.

Wednesday Evening Youth

Middle school students, join us on Jan 7th as we begin a new series exploring the book of Psalms. In this 6-week series we will explore raw faith and rich praise as we engage in learning and understanding the meaning and the message behind the Psalms that we will be exploring. This series on the Psalms is also meant to unwrap this Old Testament book so you can understand the anguish, the passion, and joy expressed by David and other Hebrew song writers—and then learn to love the same God that the ancient Jews loved so dearly.

Week 1: What's a Selah?

What the Psalms are, where they came from, and how to read them for all they are worth

Week 2: Blessing Psalms

A daily dose of blessings (Psalms 1 & 65)

Week 3: Trust Psalms

The God who really knows you (Psalm 139)

Week 4: Thanksgiving Psalms

Gratitude is next to Godliness (Psalm 118)

Week 5: Oracle Psalms

How to hear God (Psalm 95)

Week 6: Pilgrim Psalms (Songs of Ascents)

Why we take time out of the journey in order to worship (Psalm 122)

High school students, join us on Jan 7th as we will be embarking on a journey together. We will be digging into the core of who we are as we discuss the theme of rejection and explore what it means to be worthy, to be accepted, and invited in and be truly loved by Jesus. Join us for this study series as we discover that the more fully we invite God into our hearts, the less we will feel uninvited by others. With Jesus we are forever safe, we are forever accepted, we are forever held. We are completely and always invited in.

Week 1: Living Loved

Week 2: Empty or Full

Choosing to bring your emptiness or God's fullness into any situation you face.

Week 3: The Yoke of God is freedom

Attention, Intention, Prevention

Resisting God's promises make us forget God's presence. Resting in God's promises and reciting God's promises help us to remember God's presence

Week 6: Lessons from the Olive
